FROM PASTOR JAECH

Dear Friends in Christ,

When December arrives, I enjoy re-reading a reflection written by Frederick Buechner, who talks about Advent as the time of holding your breath for that which is about to happen. This is how Buechner puts it.

The house lights go off and the footlights come on. Even the chattiest stop chattering as they wait in darkness for the curtain to rise. In the orchestra pit, the violin bows are poised. The conductor has raised his baton.

In the silence of a midwinter dusk there is far off in the deep of it somewhere a sound so faint that, for all you can tell, it may be only the sound of the silence itself. You hold your breath to listen.

You walk up the steps to the front door. The empty windows at either side of it tell you nothing, or almost nothing. For a second you catch a whiff in the air of some fragrance that reminds you of a place you've never been and a time you have no words for. You are aware of the beating of your heart.

The extraordinary thing that is about to happen is matched only by the extraordinary moment just before it happens. Advent is the name of that moment.

The Salvation Army Santa Claus clangs his bell. The sidewalks are so crowded you can hardly move. Exhaust fumes are the chief fragrance in the air, and everybody is as bundled up against any sense of what all the fuss is really about as they are bundled up against the wind-chill factor.

But if you concentrate just for an instant, far off in the deeps of you somewhere you can feel the beating of your heart. For all its madness and lostness, not to mention your own, you can hear the world itself holding its breath.

Advent is indeed that moment of waiting breathlessly for that which is about to happen, which is nothing less than God coming to change the world and us. The coming weeks will undoubtedly become a rush of shopping and cooking and tasks. It can become too much at times and begin to wear us out.

In the midst of all that, I pray that you also have moments that catch you by surprise and give you a premonition of the gift that is about to unfold. The world can seem so hopelessly predictable and frozen. We are afraid we will be stuck in the same sadness forever. Yet Immanuel stirs . . . God with us and within us and for us.

The conductor has raised the baton.
What music is about to ring out!?

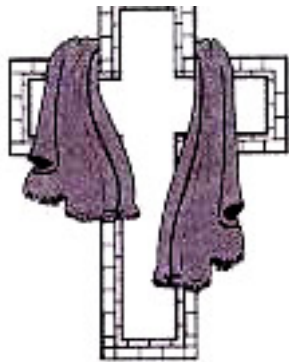
PRAYER SHAWL MINISTRY

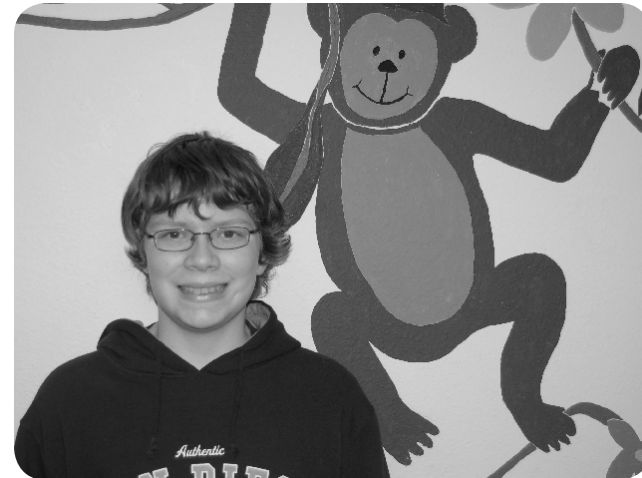

Teague Coley's visit with Benji Hellerud...

We have some wildly-energetic kids in our midst, and I thought it was high time we turned our focus to one of these promising youths. Benji Hellerud was born in Duluth, Minnesota on March 11,



1999 to his delighted parents, Jill and Dave. The youngest of three, Benji's sister, Erin, is 3 years older than he, and brother Nathan is 11 years his senior. When asked about the span of ages of his

siblings, Benji offered, "I think Nate was a surprise."

Benji's dad works as a Senior Manager of Airport Parking. This work caused their family to move several times when Benji was very young. They moved to Cudahay, Wisconsin when he was one year old, and sidled over to Muskego, Wisconsin two years later. Benji was a tough toddler. While sitting on some steps, his Grandpa came out, swinging the door wide. The door hit him in the back of the head with a "crack", and all braced for screaming. Instead, Benji just stood up and rubbed the back of his head, saying "Ow".

By age four, they relocated to New Haven, Indiana, and by five had hopped over to the greener pasture of Fort Wayne, Indiana. Benji remembers with pleasure that when his parents would leave him in the care of Erin for babysitting, the two would sit on pillows and slide down the stairs. This favorite pastime ended abruptly when

Benji hit his head hard on the wall during a particularly wild ride.

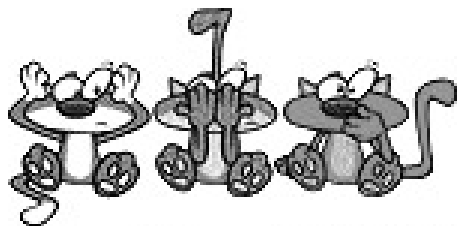

Little Benji flung the furry offender at the TV. "I don't think he really liked me after that," Benji pondered. Ironically, it was his goal in early childhood to be a veterinarian when he grew up.

Their family moved to Vancouver when Benji was in second grade, and came to BSLC soon after that. Benji is now in seventh grade and attends Wy'East. He enjoys playing alto sax in band, and hopes to join jazz band next year. He's excited to be starting tennis lessons. Benji considered running for Student Body President this fall, but opted out due to a fear of speaking in front of large groups of people.

Don't worry, Benji. Your church family is here for you and will help you work through this fear. What wonderful practice it will be for you when you make a declaration of faith next year as you complete your Confirmation studies! ☺

As Benji looks forward to high school in the next few years, he's eager to be older and more knowledgeable. "I'll be a smarticle particle," he claims. His aspirations are even greater for adulthood. Benji considers his strength to be an ability to persuade, and he hopes to be a teacher or lawyer some day.

HELP FOR & FROM The FREE CLINIC

BSLC has supported the Free Clinic of Southwest Washington for years. We have four teams preparing sack lunches on Thursdays at 4 pm for the people who use the Clinic services. The following article is reprinted from The Examiner, the newsletter of the Free Clinic.



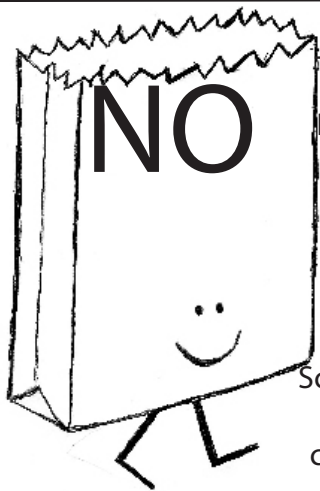
Josh is a young man who has always been active in martial arts, basketball and track. When his health started declining at age 17, it was cause for concern. "I started to lose weight in the summer of 2010, but it wasn't until I started getting sick every day and finally couldn't breathe that I went to the hospital," he says. The doctors at the hospital informed Josh that he had Type I diabetes. Type I diabetes occurs in patients whose pancreas has stopped producing enough insulin to control their blood sugar levels.

Josh had no insurance at the time and his family wasn't sure how they would pay for his insulin or regulate his diabetes. "The nurse at the hospital gave me information to set up an appointment at the Free Clinic of Southwest Washington (FCSW)." He saw a nutritionist and an endocrinologist at the FCSW. "It was helpful that they told me how insulin affects my body and exactly why I was on it. No one had told me that before."

When Josh first came to the FCSW in April 2011 he weighed 138 pounds. Today, he is back to his normal weight of 180 pounds - a healthy weight for his six foot frame. Josh has his blood sugar under control through insulin injections. Because he remains active he relies on much less insulin now. "I was on 8-9 shots a day when I was first diagnosed, but now I'm down to 2-3," he says. "It's been a lifestyle change but I'm glad I can still exercise."

Josh graduated from high school in June and attends Clark College. He now has health coverage and sees his physician regularly. Josh will always remember how the Free Clinic of Southwest Washington helped him get back on track, "The Free Clinic of Southwest Washington went out of their way to help us and to answer all of my questions. They exceeded our expectations."

Editorial.

There's a lot of disturbance in our world. There's a lot of mess. But hope is alive. God continues to love our broken world.



Long ago Micah (chapter 6, verse 8) recorded: "God has told you, mortal, what is good; and what does God require of you but to do justice, love kindness, and walk humbly with your God?"

It sounds so simple. But what is justice? For some it means retribution ... making sure the guilty get the punishment worthy of their mistakes. For Jesus it meant taking care of the widow and orphan, the poor and the weak, being a community aware of the needs of others and working to meet those needs.

And what is kindness? Is it just being "nice" all the time? We all appreciate kindnesses done to us, but what does it mean to love kindness in our increasingly sarcastic and crude society?

And how do we walk humbly with God? Anyone can do humility once in a while, but walking humbly implies doing that through all of life, not just a "once in a while" thing, and really listening to God.

The "stir up" prayers in Advent (listen for them on Sundays) in olden times were a hint to an illiterate populace to start getting the baking done before Christmas, but they are much more than that. They invite us to disturb ourselves and look at our lives and our society and see how we measure up to Micah's words.

And be willing to change things. ... How might that happen?

Quilters/ WR Work Group

The Christmas spirit was embodied in the Gifts of Hope shipped from Portland on Oct. 28 to Lutheran World Relief headquarters in Maryland and from there to points of need around the globe. Thanks to the generosity of BSLC members, our contribution consisted of 24 big boxes!



Members made 100 school backpacks filled with pencils, pens and spiral notebooks, plus in each: an eraser, scissors, box of crayons, and ruler. Gifts to enhance the educational experience of each recipient.

Over 5 dozen bath towels, toothbrushes, combs and bars of soap were donated by members. Into each towel was rolled

a nail clipper, a tooth brush, a sturdy comb and two bars of bath soap, making 64 Personal Care Kits. Gifts to enhance the health and well-being of its recipient.

Several dozen diapers were hemmed, several sweaters knit or crocheted and a dozen night gowns were made by members. In addition many pairs of infant socks, jammies, nighties, onesies, and several dozen bars of Dove soap were purchased. These items were rolled into the receiving blankets made or donated by members and pinned securely to form 11 Baby Care Kits. Gifts of comfort for the smallest, most vulnerable, to enhance the health and well-being of each.

Many dozen quilt block kits were completed by members; some made and donated whole quilt tops. The completed block kits were assembled into many of the 10 quilts that were displayed Oct. 23. The quilts from LWR provide warmth and comfort on cool nights, insulation on hot days and

God loves us even when we make a human mistake (on purpose or by accident).

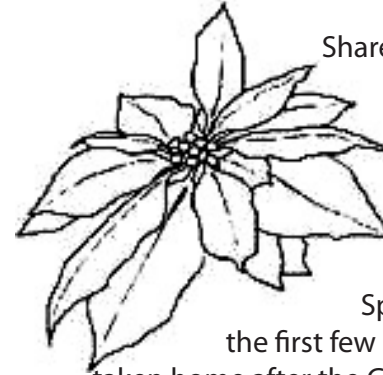
It takes practice to think ahead and understand what will happen (good or bad) if we make a certain choice.


