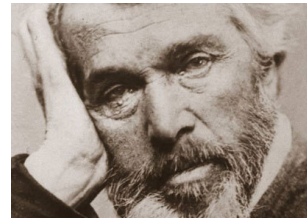

FROM PASTOR JAECH

Dear Friends in Christ,

As we approach the beginning of a New Year, I gain strength and joy from this passage from 1 John 3:2.

“Beloved, we are God’s children now; what we will be has not yet been revealed.”

What will the New Year bring? I find myself thinking about that with a mixture of intrigue, excitement and worry. What will happen in the Middle East? Will we be safe in the United States?? What will happen to the economy and all the people that are out of work? What will take place concerning my own personal hopes and dreams during the coming year?

The turning of the calendar always brings thoughts about what might be “new” in the New Year. But this year seems to bring with it a larger number of uncertainties than others. That’s why the reading from 1 John brings to me both needed strength and joy.

“Beloved, we are God’s children now; what we will be has not yet been revealed.”

Among all the things that are uncertain, there is one thing that is certain: We are God’s children right now. God loves us, delights in us and cares about us. Nothing past or future can ever take that away. Therefore, we can enter this New Year with the deep trust that, whatever might happen, we are held and loved by God, who will give us the courage, grace and wisdom to journey through the time ahead.

The scripture passage also honestly talks about how unknown and unsettled the coming year is. “...*what we will be has not yet been revealed.*” The future, namely what will happen to us and who we

will grow to be, literally is not yet settled. It is certainly not known to us. It is only in the process of being revealed.

That's always scary to us, because we like to know and control the future. However, the uncertainty and openness of the future means that God has plenty of room to bring new blessing and growth into our lives. We are not stuck in the past. God is still calling us into a new adventure.

Every once in a while, I hear about a couple giving each other a "mystery weekend." One of them tells the other to pack their bags for a weekend trip, but doesn't give any hints about where exactly they're going. The destination remains a mystery until they are actually there.

When we know the person loves us, a "mystery journey" can be exciting. It doesn't mean that there won't be some anxious moments. (Did I pack the right clothes? Why do the airline tickets say we are going to Gary, Indiana?) Beyond the anxiety of the mystery, however, we trust that we are being led by love into something good. We trust that we are being led into a deeper life together.

That is God's promise to us for the coming year. We are headed into a mystery. There are some serious questions yet to be addressed. There may even be some really painful moments along the way. However, the promise is that, throughout the year ahead, God will lead us into a deeper life of wisdom, joy and grace.

May God lead us forward into many blessings in the year to come.

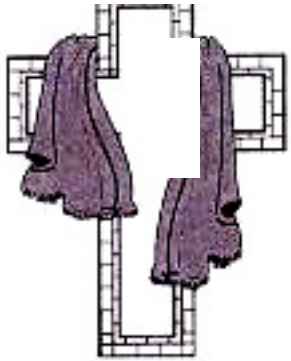

Teague Coley's visit with Joanne Vahscholtz...



Joanne's dad was Danish and mom Norwegian, and they moved from Iowa into a German community in Vancouver, WA to farm. Joanne was born in Vancouver in 1935, the youngest of 7 kids...and a big surprise! Her mom was 45, dad was 52, and youngest sibling ahead of her was 9. When Joanne's mom discovered she was pregnant well after feeling done having children, she rushed across the street to her friend and exclaimed "I can't imagine how this happened!" Her friend responded, "Well, what have you been doing?"

Two of her older sisters were married, and one had a six-week old baby when Joanne was born. So Joanne's closest playmate was her niece. When they would play together, Joanne would often say, "You have to mind me because I'm your aunt!"

By age 6, WWII broke out and one by one Joanne's four brothers enlisted. Joanne enlisted in St. John's Lutheran parochial school for grade school. She fought her own battle in first grade in a one-room schoolhouse when 2 eighth grade bullies started picking on her...pulling her hair during morning songs and forcing her to chase them at recess while hurling taunts.

Despite occasional playdates with nieces and nephews, Joanne's childhood was lonely. Their family remained isolated in the German community because the Germans drank beer and played cards while Joanne's family did not. She was essentially an only child because of the age differences, and when her brothers left she missed them terribly. She started piano lessons in fourth grade, and found a life-long joy. Between playing piano and playing with her little dog, Lilly, Joanne survived the loneliness while her brothers were gone.

Joanne graduated from parochial school as one of 4 eighth graders, and entered into high school with the shock of being in a class of 400. She enjoyed being involved with Walther League (youth group), and took organ lessons her senior year.

Strategic Plan -

BSLC's Holy Conversation begins

At the October 2011 Annual Congregational Meeting, it was announced that BSLC would embark on an update of our Strategic Plan, which was originally written in 1996. Just as Paul encouraged early Christians to live a "holy way of life," our Strategic Planning process will be a holy conversation. Holy in this context is defined as "set apart" or "not of the ordinary, but of God."

A task force (Bob Eaton, Evan Snyder, Kathie Fitzgerald, Heide Maize, and Pastor Jaech) is facilitating the process. A key role for them in this holy conversation is to create opportunities (e.g. on Sundays, Wednesday nights, small group discussions, etc.) for the congregation to share their thoughts and dreams for BSLC's future. Watch for announcements regarding upcoming opportunities over the next several months.

Our updated plan, which should be completed by May 2012, will be shaped by discussion of questions including

- Who is God calling us to be?
- Who is our neighbor?
- What do we want to be known for in the community?
- What steps do we need to take now and in the future?
- What does it look like to work our plan? How do we communicate (including celebrate and hold accountable) the plan internally? Externally? How do we check in and use the plan to inform decisions, allocate resources, etc.

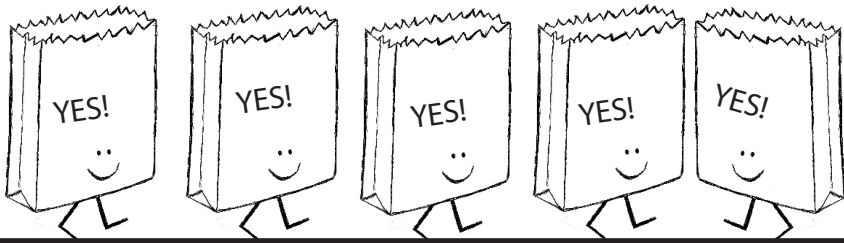

A defining time for her budding faith came when, as a senior, she spent a summer week at a Lutheran Service Volunteers school founded by Walter Wangerin Sr. This week brought her faith into focus for Joanne, and she began to evaluate and internalize her beliefs, continuing her faith journey as an adult.

Clark College had Freshman Joanne playing organ for college services. She then transferred to PLU to complete her education graduating with a major in Education with emphasis on English and French. Each summer she had worked for Western Wax Paper Company, earning almost enough to cover the next year's tuition.

Joanne began teaching in the fall of '57 in 4th grade. During the district-wide orientation prior to school starting, Joanne met Duane at a coffee break. This handsome young man, also a teacher, had just returned from army service. Sparks flew! Their courtship reads like a list of school holidays: 1st date, labor day; proposal, veteran's day; official engagement party, Christmas day; marriage, Veteran's day.

Toward the end of her engagement party Joanne got news that her father had died. Simultaneously experiencing ecstatic love and the weight of sorrow, Joanne leaned on her faith and family. Joanne and roommate, Sylvia, moved in with her mom, and the painful loss eased amidst busy preparations for the wedding.

9 months after their marriage in 1958, Joanne and Duane were blessed with daughter, Carla. A bit over a year later 2nd baby, Trina, was born. Joanne continued teaching about 3 years, then took a music theory class at Clark College and began giving piano lessons, which she did for the next 25 years. She graciously shared her musical gifts with St. John's Lutheran, as organist for the next 40 years.

When Carla and Trina were in 1st and 2nd grades, Joanne and Duane, feeling like time was going by too fast, proceeded to complete their family with 3rd daughter, Angela. However time sped forward at breakneck speed, with Joanne busy with family, church, and friends.

The two caught the traveling bug once the kids were up and out. During a trip to Germany in 1987 this dynamic, gregarious duo made life-long friends with some locals. Years of back and forth travel ensued.

After 30 years as a high school counselor, Duane retired in 1993. A year later, both felt a need for a change and left St. John's Lutheran Church after being members there for Joanne's entire life. She had come to BSLC earlier in the year for a church event and thought, "This is where I could be." From the sermons to the music, Joanne felt so welcome and filled, coming to BSLC.

2007 was an incredibly difficult year for Joanne. Duane was diagnosed with cancer and Joanne needed to undergo hip replacement surgery. Duane's health deteriorated quickly, finally going home to Jesus in December of 2007.

Joanne had to redefine her life without Duane. She continues to travel with friends, sews on occasion, and is a member of a piano group that performs for one another each month. She is a warm, exuberant member of our church family, and a blessing to all who know her.

A WHO thank you -

Ninety-four BSLC members and friends provided volunteer support at the Winter Hospitality Overflow (WHO) shelter the week of November 13th. The WHO is part of the Clark County system of emergency shelters and provides expanded capacity during the winter months when the shelter need increases. The WHO is operated through a partnership between Council for the Homeless, Share, St. Andrew Lutheran Church and St. Paul Lutheran Church.

BSLC's WHO week by the numbers: 94 on-site volunteers gave a total of 365.25 hours. 165 of those hours were from BSLC Thrivent members. Over 100 church members donated food, hats, gloves, socks, and underwear for people staying at the WHO. Special thanks to Heidi, Kathy, and Dave for their gift of time and energy in coordinating BSLC participation in the WHO.

This is an old-fashioned historical novel that alternates between the early 1940s and 1984, after Henry's wife Ethel has died of cancer.
