## BLESSING of the PETS

### St. Francis of Assisi Sunday

Each year we have a special service to thank God for the happiness which we receive from our pets and we ask a special blessing upon these animals. In order to properly care for both pets and people that Sunday, these guidelines are in order:

The Blessing will take place in the 11 AM service only. If you are allergic to animals or do not wish to participate in the blessing, we recommend that you attend the 8:30 AM service that day.

If your dog or cat is comfortable being around other people and animals, you may bring them into the sanctuary with you for the entire service. Please “water” your dogs before bringing them into the church. If your pet does not do well with others, leave it in the car and after the sermon time, the Pastor will dismiss you to go get your pet. (We’re counting on cooler weather that day).

Smaller, quiet animals (gerbils, reptiles, fish, birds, etc ...) may be brought into the church for the entire service.

We trust pet owners to use good judgment about not bringing animals that are too fearful or too aggressive in the presence of other people or other pets. God bless these blessed companions in our lives.

## SERVICE OF HEALING

October 30, Reformation Sunday

On Sunday, October 30, we will celebrate a Service of Healing at both our morning services. Through our music, prayers and reflection, we will ask God to bring healing to us, our families and our world in body, mind and spirit. 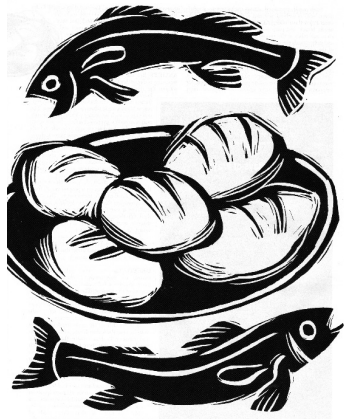

### Loaves and Fishes

You need to know...

The Firstenburg Loaves & Fishes Center is located in the Firstenburg Community Center and serves lunch with a choice of entrée. Russian entrées are available on Thursdays. In addition to hot, nutritious lunches served Monday through Friday, the center offers a wide variety of programs, from exercise to art classes to field trips and outings.

Anyone over the age of 60, regardless of income, is invited to dine. The meal is free, but there is a donation box for those who are able to help defray costs.

The noon meal supplies one-third to one-half of an older adult's daily nutrition requirements. Each menu includes salad, entree, starch, vegetable, bread, dessert, and beverage. The DASH Diet is also available for those who need diabetic, low sodium or low cholesterol meals.

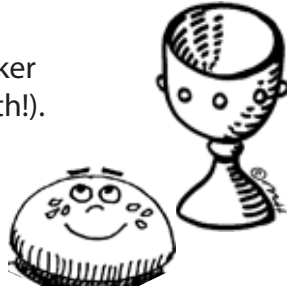

## GETTING TO KNOW YOU

Teague Coley's visit with Kaitlyn Demien...

Pastor Jaech introduced Kaitlyn Demien, our new BSLC Youth Worker, during worship September 4th. We all would like to know more!

Kaitlyn was born and raised in St. Charles, Missouri, the middle child of 3 daughters. Her father is a general contractor who owns a construction company, and her mother works in the company's marketing. Kaitlyn's mom, always heavily involved in politics, once even served as a campaign manager.



Kaitlyn grew up on her grandparent's ranch. Her family, along with two uncles and their families, lived on the family ranch in a tangle of cousins. This sounds like an idyllic childhood to us city folks, but Kaitlyn had her own twist of fate. Heavy allergies to hay, grass, dust, pollen, and anything with fur on it soon became apparent to Kaitlyn and her family. This didn't stop her from having dogs and cats, and riding horses on occasion. She simply took Benadryl to stave off the misery, and would try to "stay awake as long as I could". Perhaps the Benadryl was not as effective when Kaitlyn was asked to bale hay.

Kaitlyn grew up enjoying basketball, writing stories and poetry, and participated in Model United Nations (MUN) in high school. She

claims she was a “scary girl” in high school: tall and quiet, willing to befriend underdogs and people on the fringes, and not afraid to speak out against wrong.

So why does Kaitlyn also go by the name Fred? An eccentric uncle from Portland, OR gave every niece a boy name, bestowing “Fred” on Kaitlyn. She got used to it, and liked it. “I thought [being named Fred] was the coolest thing ever when I was a kid.” This uncle never called her any name but Fred until she was about 18, and she responds to it to this day.

When visiting this same uncle’s family in Portland, Kaitlyn fell in love with Lewis and Clark College, and decided to attend. Kaitlyn had a revelatory moment when, while attending a religion class, a fellow female student expressed an interest in someday attending seminary and becoming a pastor. Having been raised in a conservative church, Kaitlyn had never considered the leadership roles women could play in the church. It struck her that she might like to be a minister of faith as well, someday. Kaitlyn graduated from Lewis and Clark College with a major in English and minor in Religious Studies in the Spring of 2011. (Congratulations, by the way!)

Reading and writing short stories and poetry remains Kaitlyn’s greatest joy, and her favorite author is Flannery O’Conner. She is involved in two different writing groups in Portland, where each brings a piece they’ve written, reads it aloud to the group, and everyone proceeds to critique and discuss the work. Someday Kaitlyn would like to continue her education by attending graduate school to get a master’s degree in counseling, and possibly even seminary after that.

Clearly, Kaitlyn is drawn to a life of service rooted in Christ. Even as a little girl on the family ranch, Kaitlyn prayed to God every night, listing all the dogs, cats, people, and horses who needed God’s blessing, and closing with “and, please, dear God, turn me into a unicorn.” This went on every night until she was 7 or 8, when Kaitlyn’s mom gently suggested that God might want her to be a person.

We’re glad she stayed a person, too!

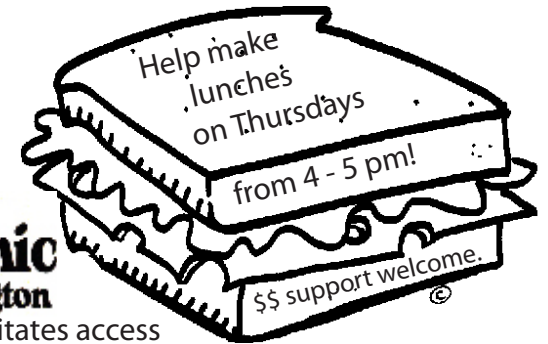

## Vancouver PEACE & JUSTICE FAIR 2011

It's hard to believe that eight successful Vancouver Peace and Justice Fairs have taken place. And Beautiful Savior Lutheran Church, through the Peace and Justice Ministry has been a part of every one of them.

The fair is a place for more than 50 organizations, including churches, working for peace or social justice to interact with each other and the public. An integral part of each fair has been the main stage entertainment. This feature has always been produced by a BSLC member: Jo'an Sterr for the first seven years and this year Bev Questad. Musicians, poets, and other entertainers use this stage to spread a message of peace, love and rock and roll!

Strolling reenactors remind attendees of the contributions of peace leaders of the past such as Ghandi, Susan B. Anthony and Jeanette Rankin (a congresswoman from Montana who voted against both world wars).

Peace and Justice volunteers host the BSLC booth offering passerbys a free cup of fair trade coffee, information about our congregation, and a chance to fashion a peace crane, as made famous by Sadako (a Japanese child who tried to make 1000 cranes to be healed from radiation sickness after the bomb). The BSLC booth is famous for the large, colorful peace cranes which decorate it.

The fair committee thanks Beautiful Savior for supplying the tables and chairs used at the park and also thanks the Youth Group for supplying the labor of transporting and setting them up.

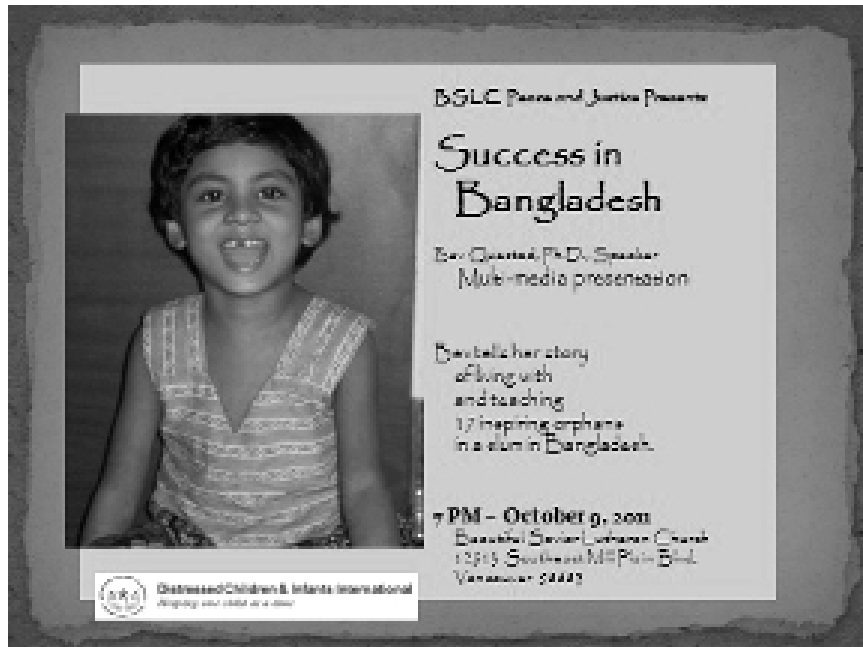

## “What did you do on your summer vacation?”

## BOOK CORNER

The Book Club selection for October by Pulitzer prize winner Geraldine Brooks, is ***Caleb's Crossing***. This novel is a short and seemingly modest historical work -- no kings, no famous events -- told by an equally modest narrator. Bethia Mayfield's given name means "servant of Jehovah," and Bethia means to abide by the rules of her family and her Puritan religious affiliation. But even as she begins writing her confession on precious scraps of scavenged paper, she is transgressing the boundaries her father and older brother consider appropriate for a woman -- and they "have God's word on this."



It is 1660, and Bethia is part of a community that has broken away from John Winthrop's colony in Massachusetts Bay and settled on what is now Martha's Vineyard. The story is based on sketchy knowledge of the life of Caleb Cheeshahteaumauk -- the first Native American to graduate from Harvard College -- and a member of the Wampanoag tribe in Martha's Vineyard.



The Book Club had an engaging discussion on the September book choice, ***Dreams of Autumn*** by Diana Gabaldon, with treats shared by Gloy Vining.

On Sunday, Oct. 9, the group will discuss ***Caleb's Crossing*** at 2:30 PM at church. It's your opportunity to examine Caleb, Bethia, etc -- with treats -- so read part or all of the book and join in the fun of talking about it.

# MARTIN LUTHER....

Summer lightning sent Martin Luther from law school to cloister when a bolt struck nearby during a journey to Erfurt, Germany in 1505. Shaken, he uttered the vow: "Help me, St. Anne! I will become a monk."

He embraced monastic life with ardor but suffered agonies of doubt over his spiritual fitness. At Wittenberg University, founded by Frederick the Wise, Luther taught the Scriptures and reached the pinnacle of academic distinction, with the right to wear the robes and beret of a doctor of theology.



But doubts endured until, finally, his study of the Epistles of the Apostle Paul led him to a revelation known as the Tower Experience. He envisioned salvation by faith alone, achieved through God's mercy, in place of church belief that entrance into heaven depended upon both faith and good works -- a spiritual balance sheet overseen by the clergy. His belief and his reliance on the Bible as the fountainhead of spiritual truth underpinned all his future thinking.

"God knows," said Luther, "that I had no thought of going so far in this matter as I have gone. I thought only to attack indulgences. If anyone had told me, when I was at the Diet of Worms: 'In six years you will have a wife and be sitting at home,' I should not have believed it."

\_ Martin Luther said this in 1532, seven years after his marriage to Katharina von Bora, who had been a nun, and eleven years after the Diet of Worms.
